What Are Victory Gardens?

The idea for Victory Gardens dates back to World War I when a severe food crisis emerged in Europe and the burden of feeding millions of people fell on the United States. Promoted through propaganda posters advocating that civilians "Sow the seeds of victory" by planting their own vegetables, the war garden movement (as it was originally known) was spread by word of mouth through numerous women's clubs, civic associations and chambers of commerce.

Shortly after the United States was drawn into the Second World War, victory gardens began to reemerge. Throughout both world wars, the Victory Garden campaign served as a successful means of boosting morale, expressing patriotism, safeguarding against food shortages on the home front, and easing the burden on the commercial farmers working arduously to feed troops and civilians overseas. VetREST's Victory Gardens serve this same purpose and is a space of peace, tranquility, education, and support.



Bybee Lakes Victory Garden

Visioned and opened in 2021, the Bybee Lakes Victory Garden is a three-acre garden on the grounds of the Bybee Lakes Hope Center, a transitional housing facility for those experiencing houselessness. The garden produces crop growth which helps feed the many Center participants and offers produce for sale at the local Famer's Market.

Metro Central Victory Garden at St. John's Village

2022 brought the birth of a new Victory Garden at St John's Village in North Portland. Chartered through a Metro Central Enhancements grant, this place of peace brings refuge and rest to the participants of the host village, a 19-unit transitional housing supportive community led by Do Good Multnomah.
